## SUMMER READING ASSIGNMENT (2023)

## Dear Rising AP English Literature and Composition Student,

The faculty in the English department at Bethlehem Academy would like to welcome you to your SENIOR year. Over the summer months, we encourage you to participate in all the usual summer activities-swimming, biking, bonfires, hanging out with friends-but we also encourage you to read! As always, the required selection for this course is The Count of Monte Cristo by Alexandre Dumas. PLEASE NOTE: You must read one of two editions: Penguin Classics ISBN\# 978-0-14-044926-6 or The Modern Library edition ISBN\# 978-0-37-576030-3. As you're reading, use the following outline and questions to guide and focus your reading. Then when you return to school in late August, be prepared to engage in a variety of activities regarding your novel as determined by Mrs. Piehl.

PART I: It is important to be able to recognize the plot summary for the novel you have read. Describe in detail the following:

Exposition. This is the novel's setting, including time period and place, and a detailed description that covers both the physical and emotional characteristics of each of the main characters. The following names are $\mathbf{2 8}$ characters that you will need to identify:

PART II: It is also important for you to identify the theme(s) of the novel you've read. What were its messages? Support your ideas with a quote or anecdote from the novel.

PLEASE NOTE: If you give yourself a week and a half off when school ends and then commit to reading just two or three chapters per day (Monday-Friday only), you will be finished with the novel before the start of school on August 29 ${ }^{\text {th }}$. DON'T WAIT TO READ THIS NOVEL!!! It will be nearly impossible to finish on time, and it won't be enjoyable to rush through it! I have provided a suggested reading schedule; feel free to follow it religiously or modify it to fit your schedule. ©
