## **Technology**

#### **Schoology**

Bethlehem Academy uses Schoology/PowerSchool to track attendance and grades and post online assignments. Each class has a Schoology web page where students view daily assignments, missing work, grades, and class resources. Encourage your child to show you his or her grades on Schoology on a regular basis. Sixth graders will receive training on Schoology in technology class.

#### Leaving Laptops at School Over the Weekend

Please see the article on the right about study tips and ways to manage laptops at home. Laptops are very exciting for middle school students to have! The laptop is a privilege that comes with responsibility. Teachers have found that students are motivated by having access to their laptops. For this reason, students may need to leave their laptops at school over the weekend if their grades are low.

Each Wednesday or Thursday during study hall, advisory teachers meet with students to complete a grade check to help them stay accountable and up-to-date on their work. If students have a D- or lower in a class, they will be asked to leave their laptops over the weekend. The grade check is completed on Wednesday or Thursday, so students have until Friday to work on improving their grades. If students need to leave their laptops at school, the students are responsible for printing any hard copies of assignments to complete over the weekend.

Teachers can make exceptions to this process. Some exceptions may include students requesting to keep a laptop because an assignment requires a laptop or students who have had extended absences.

### **Study Tips for Middle School Students**

Middle school students create and develop essential study skills that carry through to high school. Below are some tips for you to set your child up for success:

- Set a routine and find a consistent place and time for completing homework.
- Ask your child to show his or her grades to you on Schoology. All students will soon know how to log in and show you their progress. In addition, Schoology is the resource for your child to find daily lessons, homework, and look ahead for tests/quizzes. If your child is absent, Schoology is the tool to access the classwork/homework your child has missed.
- Check for missing work. Many times grades are low because a student is missing work. Encourage your child to check Schoology for missing work.
- Each class has many ways to study. To study, your child can use Quizlet, flashcards, study guides, reviews, or even teach you what they are learning! For additional support, your child can meet with his or her teacher and/or school counselor.
- Set boundaries for technology. Teens love technology for learning, socializing, and entertainment. Create clear rules about when and where your child can use his or her school laptop. If the school laptop is too much of a distraction at home, you can set up a plan to store your child's laptop in your bedroom or a safe place where he or she can not access it during the night. You can also contact your child's teachers/counselor to discuss keeping the laptop at school.
- Connect with your child's teacher if you have concerns, questions, or celebrations.
- Keep devices out of your child's bedroom at night. The middle school staff has seen an increase in students who cannot stay awake in class. Create an environment where your child cannot access technology during sleeping hours.
- Allow your child to make mistakes. Middle school is a good time to allow your child to work on independence and responsibility. See how your child does with more freedom with schoolwork. If he or she fails at something, have a discussion about the lesson learned from the experience. Middle school is a great time to make mistakes and learn from them!



# Religion

Students have religion class each day as well as school Mass weekly. Classes take turns hosting and planning Masses throughout the year. Classes also have opportunities to visit the chapel for Adoration throughout the year.

#### Service Hours

One of the requirements for religion class is that each student completes at least four hours of service per semester. Most service hours take place outside the school day. For example, a student could earn service hours by raking a neighbor's yard, helping an elderly friend or younger children, or volunteering at St. Vincent de Paul. Any students unsure if an opportunity of service would count toward service hours should speak with their religion teacher. Typical household chores would not count toward hours.

### **CARDS**

CARDS stands for character, accountability, respect, decision-making, and service. Ask your child how they have been using these character traits to build up a positive, respectful learning environment.

# **Academic Support**

Teachers are available before and after school to help students by appointment. Please encourage your children to advocate for themselves and ask teachers for help. We might not know they need help unless they ask!

### Study Hall/Advisory

Middle school students will have study hall with their advisory teachers every day. During these times, students will have the opportunity to complete homework and ask for help. Students are encouraged to connect with teachers at this time for extra help.

#### Resource Teacher

Mrs. Kohl is available at specific periods of the day to work with students. She teams with MS teachers to help support the learning needs of our students.

### Homework Club

Homework Club is an after-school program for students to get extra support. Mrs. Kohl will be available Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays until 4:00 in Room 204 to help students with homework. Students are asked to sign in each time they attend Homework Club. In the past, some students have told their families they were attending Homework Club, but ended up spending time with friends instead. Students attend Homework Club on a voluntary basis, so feel free to check up on your children to make sure they are where they say they are!



# Locks

At orientation, students had the option to have locks on their lockers. Most students did not take one, but if they would like one, they can request it from the office.



# **Backpacks**

Teachers in the main middle school hallway, nearest the lockers, have requested that backpacks stay in lockers.
