Lewiston-Altura High School Requirements

- Students must take 8 credits of classes each year for 4 years for a total of 32 credits. Some of these are required and some are electives. Diploma requirements are 30 credits.
- Required Classes (19 credits):
 - English 4 credits
 - Social Studies 4 credits
 - Science 3 credits
 - Mathematics 3 credits
 - Fine Arts 1 credit
 - Physical Education/Health Education 2 credits
 - Business ½ credit must be Economics unless embedded in Social Studies
 - Career Education − ½ credit
 - Technology Elective ½ credit
 - Agriculture Education ½ credit
- Elective Credits (11 credits)

College Diplomas

- Degree: A diploma or title awarded to students by a college or university after successful completion of a program of study
- Associates Degree: An undergraduate degree. Requires two years of full-time study
- Bachelor's Degree: An undergraduate degree. Requires at least four years (or the equivalent) of full-time study.
- Master's Degree: A graduate degree. An advanced program of study. Requires one or two years of full-time study beyond the bachelor's degree.
- Doctorate (Ph. D): The highest academic degree. Requires at least three years of graduate study beyond the master's degree.

Recommended High School Classes for a Four-Year College

- English 4 years
- Social Studies 3.5-4 years
- Mathematics 3 to 4 years
- Science 3 years

- Foreign Language 2 years
- Computer Classes (highly recommended)

10th Grade College Prep

- Select challenging courses
- Pay attention to G.P.A./Class Rank
- Stay on track
- Begin exploring careers
- Start prepping for the ACT (MCIS)
- Check out possible colleges
- Start putting a job resume together
- Volunteer/Community Service

11th Grade College Prep

- Take the PSAT in the fall
- Plan to take the ACT in spring/summer
- Start visiting college campuses/meet with Reps
- Take challenging courses
- Take leadership positions in school and activities
- Maintain successful grades in all courses
- Job resume
- Volunteer/Community Service

12th Grade College Prep

- Write down all deadlines
- Don't drop challenging courses
- Fill out applications early in the fall
- Apply for financial aid any time after October
 1st
- Maintain successful grades in all courses
- Retake ACT if wanted/needed
- Job Resume
- Volunteer/Community Service

- Advanced Standing Agreements (with Technical Colleges)
- College level classes in high school (Advanced Placement – AP)
- Post-Secondary Education Options (PSEO)
- College Level Examination Prep (CLEP)
- Concurrent Enrollment Courses

Common University Admissions Requirements

- Rigorous Core Classes
 - Advanced Math, English, Social Science, or Science
 - Avoid the "senior slump." Just because graduation requirements are ment, don't stop working hard – colleges look at that!
- ACT/SAT Scores
- GPA
- Class Rank

- \$59.00 for all others
- Desired Scores (at least 21-23)
- Send scores to colleges (4 for free)

College Application Process

- Deadlines for Applications
 - Priority consideration deadlines are usually
 December 1 for the following fall admissions
- Requirements for Applications
 - Complete application
 - Transcripts
 - May require an essay
- If you're applying online, check to see if there is a form for the counselor to fill out. Also, when applying, let the counselor know so transcripts can be sent. (Warning: Colleges <u>Don't</u> Contact us for Transcripts)

- Types of Financial Aid
 - Student Loans
 - Money has to be repaid
 - Low interest loans for students
 - Work Study
 - Students work at college to help pay for tuition
 - Grants
 - Money does not have to be repaid
 - Mostly comes from state and federal government
 - Scholarships
 - Money does not have to be repaid
 - Students earn scholarships in many different ways
