

\$1,000 Sustainable Grant Awarded to Nevis Public Schools

The Nevis softball team has been asking for the school to provide power to the two dugouts on the softball field so they are able to use it for such items as a pitching machine. The school has been reluctant to spend the money, so one of our local contractors, Levi Durgin owner of Levi Durgin Electric, LLC has offered to provide the materials for the project.

Levi is one of the volunteer instructors for our trade's class. He will be teaching the electrical portion for a two-week period again this fall. During some of his portion of the course, he is going to have the kids from the trade's class help with the labor portion of the underground electrical installation.

The project will consist of trenching in underground wire approximately 75' from where they are able to tie into a power source to the first dugout. From there they will trench behind the backstop and over to the other dugout which is about another 150'. The students will be involved in trenching, hand digging, running conduit, installing receptacle boxes/outlets and terminating at the power source. All of which will provide them a first-hand experience of one of the many things an electrician may do from day to day.

The plan is to begin and complete the project during the 2 weeks that Levi is teaching the class, which will be 10/2/23-10/13/23. While our class this semester will consist of all males, I feel it will be a great show of support to have them take on a project that will directly benefit females in our school, particularly the softball players for years to come.



I would like to thank MASMS for numerous things, First, thank you for awarding Nevis the sustainability grant. That \$1000 will go a long way in helping cover the cost of the project. I believe by the end of the day tomorrow it will be done and the assistance from MASMS made it possible!

I would also like to say thank you for being awarded a \$500 Building and Grounds grant. It will be put to good use and is appreciated by my team and I.

Finally, thank you for giving me a platform to showcase our trades class. We are very proud of it and feel we are providing avenues these students may not know existed.

No Special Session - Legislative Interim Continues

Concerns about new legislation creating prohibitions on the use of restraints boiled over at the start of the school year and several schools saw the loss of Student Resource Officer services as law enforcement agencies pulled back amidst uncertainty with the new law. Discussions between state officials, school district and law enforcement representatives culminated in an opinion by the Attorney General stating that the law enforcement statute governing use of force (MS 609) would prevail in the interim, thus buying the legislature time to work on the issue with an eye toward efforts to clarify these statutes during the next legislative session. To be clear, student advocacy groups support the new law and don't think it needs to be changed. Others believe the law should be clarified to allow for more professional judgement by school staff in situations that aren't as cut and dry as when bodily harm or death or factually evident. This is a very nuanced issue and nobody wants to see students injured in choke holds, but managing difficult student behaviors, unfortunately, has become an ever present issue for schools.

With talks of a special session in the rearview mirror advocacy groups, including MASMS, continue to press the MN Department of Education, the Governor's office and legislators, for continued improvements to school finance formulas. For MASMS, improving LTFM and expanding Health & Safety levy uses for things like roofs, pavements and HVAC systems continue to be at the forefront of our conversations. Last session MDE brought in a proposal to expand Health & Safety to include roofs, pavements and HVAC systems, but unfortunately, these provisions didn't make it into the final E-12 funding package. The 2024 session is technically not a budget setting session, but the legislature often considers a supplemental budget to adjust the two-year budget that was most recently enacted. We're pushing MDE to bring back some, if not all of the Health & Safety changes they brought in last year and roof projects seems to have gained interest with a modest price tag for the state's share of the potential costs.

Minnesota Management & Budget (MMB), the state's lead fiscal agency, will release a formal budget forecast in early December. That will tell us where the state budget is at in the wake of the epic 2023 session. The legislature formally reconvenes on Monday, February 12 and can work until May 20. They aren't required to pass any legislation in 2024, and some would prefer that. At a minimum we expect them to pass a Capital Investment or "Bonding" bill, that will fund facility needs for state owned properties and some city/county projects. If a supplemental budget bill starts to emerge we'll be ready to push for improvements to school facility revenue programs.
