Protect Yourself from Email Scams

Just last week I received an email that appeared to be from the President of MASMS saying that the Treasurer of MASMS was out and he needed a MASMS related payment made and if I could help with that. I knew right away it was one of the many email phishing scams that I get routinely – likely they pulled our names and emails off of the internet.

Another real example happened years ago: I was camping and hadn't checked my emails in couple days, I fired up my phone and saw a string of emails regarding a wire transfer of money that I had supposedly requested be done. It started with an email to one of our accounting staff, that looked like it came from me, asking to wire over \$20,000 to a bank account in Texas. By the time I saw these and called my office, one of our staff was literally standing in line at the bank waiting to transfer the funds, but thankfully we stopped it in time. After that happened, I specifically met with our accounting staff and said I will never ask for a wire transfer, you should always see me in person or at least call me to confirm it is actually me asking for something like this, etc.

These email scams get more sophisticated all the time, but there are some things you can do to learn to spot these attempted scams and protect yourself from falling for one:

Email scams often contain some sort of urgency to them – they find some way to pressure you to act quickly. Creating a false sense of urgency is a common trick, don't fall for it – take some time to look at the email carefully, slow down and think, take time to confirm it is legitimate and/or actually from the person it looks like it's from!

Another very common component of these email scams is something like "I am in a meeting now so don't call me" or "I am not available by phone" or some other reason that you shouldn't call the apparent sender of the email. That is a huge flag – they obviously don't want you to call the "real" person and find out that they didn't send the email and it is a scam!

Bad grammar and bad spelling are also quite common in scam emails, or even things like odd greetings or sign-offs at the end of the email. For example, when I email an employee, I usually start with "Hi" and not "Warm Greetings" or some other odd phrase. These scam emails are getting more sophisticated all the time so don't assume they all will have bad grammar or spelling, but if they do that is another red flag and you should not fall for it!

Resist the urge to click on any suspicious links or attachments – if you don't know what it is or why it was sent to you then assume it is a scam or malware and DO NOT click on the link or attachment! I get these quite often as well, with very generic information like "Here is your invoice" or "You have a digital voicemail" and then there is a link or attachment. If you aren't sure, again you can always call the company or person that it looks like it's from but never contact the scammer directly or use a number in the email – look it up independently and call that number instead. Many times these scammers will make that attachment very tempting to open, calling it something like "confidential salary info" or some other title that just makes you really tempted to see it. Don't click on any links or attachments unless you are 100% sure what they are and who they came from!

I can't tell you how often I and others receive emails along the lines of "I need you to do me a favor, I'm in a meeting so don't call me, but I need you to buy some gift cards for me". Don't fall for it! I even receive scam text messages at times, usually with a link that I am supposed to click. These scams are everywhere now! Hopefully these tips will help you identify potential scam emails and avoid becoming a victim of one. Be careful!

How to Network Effectively at a Conference

- 1. Have Clear Goals and Objectives—who you would like to meet and what you want to take away.
- 2. **Go Prepared.** If there are specific attendees, vendors or speakers you hope to meet and talk to, do your research and prepare ahead of time.
- 3. **Be ready with conversation starters.** "Where are you from?" "What did you find interesting at the conference so far?" "What has been your favorite sessions/speakers so far?" "I'm trying to improve (fill in the blank) what are you doing, any tips?" "What sessions are you looking forward to?"
- 4. **Be Approachable.** Don't spend your time outside of sessions using your phone or laptop. By looking open you'll make it more likely that someone looking for someone to talk to, will approach you!
- 5. Plan the sessions you would like to attend in advance. You cannot be at every session, don't miss the opportunity to be in the sessions that will be the most benefit for you.
- 6. Check the Name Tag. It's always okay to check out someone's name tag if you want to know who "that someone" is—that's why they provide them at the conference.
- 7. Keep in Mind that Most People at the Conference are in the Same Situation as You! During session introduce yourself to the people on each side of you.
- 8. Get the Conference App. This will help you keep on schedule and find the sessions you want. In the app you may also find contact info for others that you meet.
- 9. Bring Business Cards or quick notes with your contact info. You may have only a brief moment to make contact with someone and handing them your contact info is always better than a missed opportunity.
- 10. Connect Socially. Be sure to find some fun with other attendees at the evening events!

As it stands right now, LTFM requires us to go into the red in order to complete the necessary projects like replacing our roofs and sealing our windows to keep the building free of contaminants and moisture it was created to support!! In your buildings, there is a misperception by many in administration that LTFM is a pot of money that easily takes care of maintaining our facilities. Much of this misperception is due primarily because most members of the administration don't engage in discussions about LTFM on a weekly basis so they are making assumptions about how it works and what it can be used for. More than once I had a principal ask to use LTFM to address a pet project over the summer which had nothing to do with LTFM. The more we interject information about the LTFM projects we are planning for, the better they will understand the financial limitations of the maintenance department.

START TALKING TO YOUR LOCAL REPRESENTA-TIVE NOW!. Invite your local representative to spend an hour with you walking through your buildings and share with him/her how you put LTFM dollars to work. As you

walk through a building, point out all the work you have been able to complete thanks to LTFM funding and thank them for that. Let them see those facilities correction you are holding off on due to having to overspend your LTFM to address items of greater importance like your roofs and parking lots.

We learned listening to Sam that many legislators are pulled in so many directions it is hard for them to fully understand LTFM and the limitations it currently has. Most legislators are simply members of your community who are willing to give of their time to try and make their community a better place. Give one a call and invite them to join you. This is a good time to do it and a good time to increase our building and local leaders' understanding of our facilities needs.

Congratulations again on all you and your staff did to prepare your schools for learning! Smell the Roses. Take time for yourself to renew!





How to have Better Conversations!

We've all had really great conversations. The kind of conversation where you walk away feeling engaged and inspired, or where you feel like you made a connection or you've been perfectly understood. There is no reason most interactions cannot be like that.

If you choose just one of the following and master it, you'll enjoy better conversations.

Number One: **DON'T MULTITASK** Set your phone down, be present. Be in the moment. If you want to get out of the conversation, get out of it, but don't be half in and half out.

Number Two: LEARN Enter every conversation assuming that you have something to learn. "Everyone you will ever meet knows something that you don't."

Number Three: Use Open-Ended Questions Enter every conversation assuming that you have something to learn. "Everyone you meet knows something that you don't." Use questions like "What was that like?" "How did that feel?"

Number Four: Go With the Flow When thoughts come into your mind, let them go. When you are thinking of things not in the conversation, you probably stop listening.

Number Five: If you don't know, say you don't know!

Error on the side of not knowing everything!

Number Six: Don't equate all your experiences with theirs. All experiences are individual. And most importantly, it's not about you. Share how you relate, but don't make it all about your experiences.

Number Seven: Try not to repeat yourself. It's condescending and boring, and we all tend to do it a lot. If we have a point to make, we just keep rephrasing it over and over. Try not to do that.


Number Eight: Stay out of the weeds.

Number Nine: Listen.
