It has been a busy month at the MPA. I have been across the state, either participating in or facilitating professional development for all educational leaders. I also had the privilege of being invited along with six other states to go back to Capital Hill and talk with our Congressional Representative to advocate for the needs and issues that all of you face on a daily basis. While I was there, Senator Collins and Senator Smith took the lead in recognizing October as *National Principals Month*.

I am happy to report that as I spoke with Senators Collins and King, as well as Representative Pingree's office, all of Maine's delegates fully support funding for Title II (professional development), Title IV (Student support and academic enrichmentgrants), Mental Health Services for Students Act, Safe Schools Improvement Act, Trauma-Informed Schools Act, and the Higher Education PREP Act.

Senate Passes Collins, Smith Resolution Recognizing October as National Principals Month

Washington, D.C. — U.S. Senators Susan Collins (R-ME) and Tina Smith (D-MN), members of the Senate Education Committee, announced that their bipartisan resolution recognizing October 2019 as National Principals Month passed the Senate unanimously. This resolution recognizes the important role principals play in ensuring that every child has access to a high-quality education.

"Principals in Maine and across the country are stalwarts of our education system, working with teachers, parents, and local communities to make a difference in the lives of students and prepare them for the future," **said Senator Collins**. "This bipartisan resolution dedicates the month of October to our nation's principals, recognizing their countless contributions and tireless devotion to ensure that every child has access to a high-quality education."

"School principals are community builders, academic leaders, facility managers and so much more," **said Senator Smith**. "They're responsible for creating school environments where every child can succeed, and where teachers and faculty can get the support they need to educate students and help shape them into future leaders. We need to do all we can to recruit, support and retain effective school principals."

This month, Senator Collins met with Holly Couturier, the Executive Director of the Maine Principals' Association (MPA) Professional Division, to discuss issues facing school leaders in Maine. As a member of the Senate Education Committee, Senator Collins has been working to address the teacher shortage in rural areas of Maine and throughout the country. In March, she introduced the *Preparing and Retaining Education Professionals (PREP) Act* with Senator Tim Kaine (D-VA), legislation to increase access to high-quality teacher and leader training programs and extend federal support for educator recruitment. The MPA has endorsed this legislation.



PR Tips

Tips for Conducting Effective Parent-Teacher Conferences

Parent-Teacher Conferences are the best venue for teachers to have direct contact with parents on a one-to-one basis. Here are some tips that principals can give their teachers during this important meeting.

- Listen. Welcome parental questions and input. Always ask parents directly what they want the school to know about their child.
- Avoid an adversarial (you/us) atmosphere. Stress cooperation and partnership.
- Deal with more than letter grades and numbers. Report cards can do that. Talk about feelings, impressions, attitudes, and values.
- Give parents as accurate a picture of their child's development as possible. Use examples or a portfolio of the student's work and make meaningful comparisons. The best comparison is with a child's own potential. Downplay comparisons with siblings, friends, and classmates.
- Begin and end the Parent-Teacher Conference on time. If needed, make arrangements to follow-up and meet again soon.
