#### From the President ...

As I pondered the possible topics I could write about for this month's *Apprise* article, there were many things

that came to mind. The one that jumped out at me was to write about our organization and all it has to offer. I certainly realize the Maine Principals' Association means different things to different people, and I wanted to make sure our membership, including non-members who read this article, know more about the organization and what it has to offer.

I was recently asked to present to the Maine School Boards Association's Board of Directors. Their agenda asked that I report out about our current membership and the mission statement of our organization. In addition, I was asked to discuss what big issues Maine administrators are facing with all of the educational changes taking place. I was surprised as I presented to notice their reaction, which gave me the indication that they did not know many things about our organization. This has inspired me to share a bit of this information with you.

Currently the MPA has 746 members who support the two sides of the organization: professional and interscholastic. I would like to take a moment to elaborate about each side of the organization further. The professional division supports all Maine educators, but focuses on professional development and mentoring of Maine administrators. We have made it a priority to expand the services we offer to Maine administrators by adding new professional development opportunities and the creation of the School Resource tab on the MPA website. Staff person Holly Couturier is leading the expansion of the professional side by hosting webinars, conducting regional meetings for administrators, and populating the School Resources page of the website.

The interscholastic division supports 18 different sports that occur in the fall, winter, and spring. The MPA is extremely proud to be able to support so many different activities for the youth of Maine. We offer six different activities in the fall including: cross country, soccer, golf, football, volleyball, and field hockey. We offer seven opportunities in the winter including: ice hockey, indoor track, swimming, cheering, skiing, basketball, and wrestling. Finally, we offer five opportunities in the spring including: baseball, softball, tennis, lacrosse,

- ✓ Is the front office bright and cheer-
- ✓ *Is there a separate sitting area for* adult visitors?
- ✓ Are copies of the building newsletter, district information, school handbook, and materials about the PTA/PTO within easy reach?
- ✓ Are the "addresses" for the school website and social media displayed?





# **Brunswick Junior High School**

Brunswick Junior High School houses grades 6-8 school in Brunswick. The 505 students are taught by 62 teachers and 12 educational technicians. They have a 31% free and reduced lunch rate and a 17% special education population.

Led by the 2015 Maine Principal of the Year, Walter Wallace, Brunswick Junior High School is housed in a building that is almost 60 years old. The building itself may be older, but what is taking place inside the walls is innovative and great for kids! "Our goal is to know all of the kids well," says Mr. Wallace.

Each student at Brunswick Junior High School has at least one adult who is "assigned" to them through the advisor program. The students know that the staff care about their education, and who they

are as individuals. Every school day begins with an advisory of no more than 10 kids to one adult. This advisory time is an opportunity for the kids to talk to each other and the adult in the room. This safe space allows for the students to share experiences and get extra help if needed. This also allows for the staff to check in with students to see if they are ready to learn. If not, the adult has a team available to provide additional support for the individual student. The advisor time is a non-scripted time where students are truly present and "get ready for the day."

Each of the three grades consists of two teams. These teams work with the same kids on a daily basis. Each team has a guidance counselor who works with smaller groups of students- again, meeting the individual student's needs. The teams consist of four core teachers who meet every other day to discuss student issues and curriculum connections. Additional staff are also team members to allow for small advisory classes.

Teacher leadership is paramount at Brunswick Junior High School. In addition to team meetings, there are team leaders for each of the teams who meet weekly with the building assistant principal. There are also department heads who meet regularly with the principal. "We have a great teacher leader system to support our goals," stated Mr. Wallace.

There is a strong RTI team at the school that is available to help support the students. When the Brunswick Naval Air Station closed and the school's population decreased dramatically, Brunswick Junior High was fortunate to allow for master level teachers to be retained in the building and be additional math and/or ELA support for students. These master level teachers work with students in small groups and during class time to help those not meeting standards.

There are many aspects to Brunswick Junior High School that makes this school stand out. From supporting students in any



after-school activity that the students may want to join, to the 73 students who signed up and are now going to be in the school musical, low class sizes, or the focus on anti-bullying, Brunswick Junior High School is a special school that truly focuses on its students.

# Buxton Center Elementary School

Buxton Center Elementary School is the largest elementary school in the Bonny Eagle School District. The 640 students are taught by 38 teachers and up to 35 educational technicians. They have a 44% free and reduced lunch rate and an 18% special education population.

Led by the 2015 Maine NAESP Assistant Principal of the Year- and now proud principal-Kim O'Donnell, Buxton Center Elementary is a Prek-grade 5 school that exudes collaboration and support for students, staff, and the community. Five years ago, Buxton Center was built to consolidate four community elementary schools. The staff has worked hard to create a positive climate and culture that welcomes all with open arms.

The district made the choice to consolidate all of the intensive needs programs into the school. This integration program has proven to be successful time and time again. When walking through the halls, or "Villages," Ms. O'Donnell would point out classrooms that were identified as "special needs," or as a "behavior room." Because all students are welcome into all rooms, one would never know the intense amount of education being taught to these students to help them be successful. Each student in Buxton Center is viewed as "My" student by staff. There is sense of ownership in the success of all students that is shared by 100% of the staff.



This ownership goes beyond the classroom. Recognizing the high number of hungry students, the staff decided to help out by creating their own "Backpack Program." They collect food each week and on Fridays, the staff pay \$1 each to wear jeans. The staff of Buxton Center has partnered with Whole Foods and raffles baskets to raise money to help support this program. This money is collected and buys additional food to help feed more than 12 families each weekend.

Outside in the yard, classrooms have strategically planted vegetables that are currently being harvested by the students.



Originally started with a Food Corp Volunteer, the raised beds were maintained over the summer by the Extended Summer School Services students and all students are reaping the benefits of their hard work because the vegetables they have raised are served in their cafeteria. The beds were specifically designed so that students in wheelchairs could also help with the planting and harvesting, so no child is left behind.

A fun and exciting fact about Buxton Center Elementary is they are 1 of 23 schools who were awarded a grant to fully fund a Mandarin Teacher in their school through the Teacher of Critical Languages Program. Every kindergarten student in the Bonny Eagle School District is bussed to Buxton Center weekly to learn

Mandarin and every student in Buxton Center Elementary has the unique opportunity to learn a different language and culture.

If you have a chance to visit this beautiful school, I highly encourage you to do so!

# Mallett (W.G.) School

W.G. Mallett Elementary School is the prek-grade 2 elementary school in the Mt. Blue School District in Farmington. The 365 students are taught by 20 teachers, three SED teachers, four teachers who are math or literacy specialists, and 18 educational technicians. They have a 54% free and reduced lunch rate and a 13% special education population.



Led by the 2015 Maine's National Distinguished Principal, Tracy Williams, W.G. Mallett School focuses on creating a positive climate for all students and the community. When asked "What makes your school amazing?" Mrs. Williams proudly stated, "We put a positive spin on everything."

The majority of the staff at W.G. Mallett are trained in Positive Behavior Intervention Supports (PBIS), Restorative Practices, Kelso's Choices beginning in kindergarten, and most recently are working on Collaborative Problem Solving with Ross Greene. These practices all help the staff focus on creating an environment that is completely focused on students. The RTI model that is in place involves the entire staff as well. During their regular PLC meetings, the staff are trained on how to focus on the "12-minute Student Review Protocol." This allows the staff to have a focused discussion on each of the students and then determine the best educational plan for them.



If anyone needs additional support, there is a guidance team who works closely with the students. There are groups that meet on a regular basis to help students with sharing, anxiety, loss, friendship issues, etc. Whatever the need, there is a plan to help support the students. Not only do the staff focus on the needs of the students, they also focus on the families. Partnering with the Franklin County Task Force, the staff work with parents in their homes to best support them and their children.

Staff development is a priority at W.G. Mallett. The staff recognize that they are very fortunate to have a late arrival every Wednesday and two staff meetings every month to focus on the expertise

of teaching. Mrs. Williams has a rotation of professional development that includes literacy, math, technology, behavior, and teacher evaluation. The PD will include a professional reading to discuss best practices and on literacy days, the entire staff will watch a video to score a running record to calibrate and/or recalibrate as a staff. The focus of each professional development day is to elevate the learning of all students.

Beautiful on the inside and out, five-year-old W.G. Mallet has brought it's history with the new learning outside space. The community included granite from the former school and created beautiful flower beds to help create a comfortable and welcoming place for all.

W.G. Mallett is definitely a school to visit!


