History of the RIIL

March 9, 1899: A meeting was held with delegates from Cranston High School, Hope High School, East Providence High School and Classical High School to state their ideas as to the advisability of forming a league. On a motion made and carried, the league was formed by the schools represented and officers were elected.

A committee was elected to draw up articles of agreement, and Article 1 named the association The Interscholastic League. In all, 15 articles of agreement were discussed by section and adopted.

The first recognized sport was baseball, and the member schools were asked to develop the schedule. On June 13, 1899, the Interscholastic League awarded Classical High School the Baseball Championship of the 1899 season.

September 29, 1899: Manual Training High School, Providence English High School and Pawtucket High School were admitted to membership. In addition, the committee approved a football season. The football schedule was approved, and the first football game was held on October 13, 1899 between Cranston High School and East Providence High School, with East Providence prevailing, 5-0. The Spalding Football Rules were adopted. East Providence High School was awarded the first Football Championship.



January 23, 1900: The Board of Directors moved and seconded that the sport of polo be accepted. Hope St. High School was awarded the first Polo Championship in 1900.

February 23, 1900: The Board of Directors voted to approve five eligibility rules to be applied to all League Athletics:

- •No professionals were allowed to participate
- •The Board of Directors would investigate all eligibility matters
- •Five years of eligibility for each player
- •There was a transfer rule
- •Penalty for violations was forfeiture

May 5, 1900: The league approved the Interscholastic Field Athletic Meet (track & field). Classical High School was awarded the first Field Day Championship.

January 1901: The Board of Directors voted mandating that all member schools submit a list of eligible athletes in all sports.

December 16, 1901: Woonsocket High School was admitted to the Interscholastic League.



History of the RIIL

December 2, 1902: The Board of Directors voted to allow the league to arrange for a hockey season. Hope St. High School was awarded the first Hockey Championship for the 1903 season.

March 1904: The Board of Directors voted to approve the National League Baseball Rules with the exception of the foul strike.

Initial League Issues:

- * Uneven competition
- * Lack of eligibility standards
- * Organization
- * Spectator riots, mob scenes....
- * Few suitable playing surfaces
- * No professional preparation for coaches
- * Officials were usually chosen from the crowd
- * If the home team lost the visiting team was stoned out of town

1928: A group of high school principals became interested in forming an organization which would control and administer athletics as one of its objectives.

1932: The R.I. Secondary School Principals' Association was organized, defining its objectives as follows: *Its object shall be to raise the standards of the secondary schools of RI and to advance the professional interests of the members of this association.*

Committees were established: * R.I. Honor Society * Relations with the Office of the R.I. State Director of Education * Athletics


March 1932: The Interscholastic League was formally organized as it is today. It was organized to meet the expressed needs of high schools for a functional sports program that would be governed by a committee of principals.

1952: The RIIL joined the National Federation of State High School Associations.

Today: Now in its 123rd year of existence, the R.I. Interscholastic League is governed by the Principals' Committee on Athletics, and its 73 member schools.







Services to Member Schools

The Rhode Island Interscholastic League is a service organization providing its member schools with publications, training opportunities, recognition programs, tournaments, rules interpretation meetings and other services that assist in the administration of interscholastic sports.

Athletic Rules and Regulations

Enforces the by-laws and regulations for the RIIL.

♦ Recognition

The RIIL recognizes and congratulates the accomplishments of numerous athletes, teams, coaches, athletic directors and school administrators.

Official Pay Program

Through the RefView Program, the RIIL assists school Athletic Directors and Business Offices in the assignment and payment of game officials.

♦ Computer Management Program

Tool that will upgrade and improve information for all RIIL fans. In addition, it will streamline all RIIL management functions for school Athletic Directors and coaches.

♦ Support the Needs of the RIIAAA

Every two years, the RIIL and the RIAAA conduct an extensive and objective process of aligning teams in all sports. This process serves to provide competitive balance among all teams in all sports.

Tournaments

The League supervises and administers state tournaments in 30 sports, as well as esports, for its member schools. The RIIL assists the media outlets statewide in their coverage of high school sports.

Student Leadership Conferences

The League sponsors numerous opportunities for student-athletes to take part in an assortment of leadership and sportsmanship activities, such as the New England Student Leadership Conference and NFHS National Student Leadership Summit.

RIIL WEBSITE/SOCIAL MEDIA

We continue to upgrade and improve the riil.org website, which features a new homepage, online statistics, links to RIIL initiatives and resources for coaches, officials, student-athletes and parents. RIIL Director of Multimedia Content Carolyn Thornton is an experienced journalist who oversees the league's Twitter, Instagram and Facebook pages, as well as the RIIL Blog. These social media platforms allow the RIIL to inform parents and student-athletes about important RIIL initiatives, provide real-time updates on RIIL events and happenings and share the accomplishments of member schools.

♦ RIIL/NFHS Network

The RIIL has partnered with the NFHS Network to stream tournament events and promote a school broadcast program. The RIIL/NFHS Network Sport has produced internet broadcasts for most sports during the past six years of operation. The NFHS Network School Broadcasting Program gives all of our schools and communities the opportunity to highlight our programs, our fans and our athletes. By the spring of 2021, 37 schools were utilizing a new automated sport production product—Pixellot. This new hardware/ software solution is for schools that have limited broadcasting resources



RIIL "TRAFFIC SAFETY IS A TEAM SPORT" PROGRAM

Through a grant from the R.I. Department of Transportation, the RIIL joined RIDOT in its mission to reduce the number of traffic crashes and fatalities in the State of Rhode Island through highway safety awareness. Student-athletes and members of the community were encouraged to take an online Traffic Safety Pledge, and messages delivered on RIIL social media and at RIIL events focused on Occupant Safety, Impaired Driving, Speed and Distracted Driving.





UNIFIED SPORTS PROGRAM



The RIIL and Special Olympics Rhode Island began a partnership to establish a Unified Basketball League in 2010, followed soon after by a Unified Volleyball League. Unified Basketball has since grown to include 36 high school teams, while there are 22 high school teams competing in Unified Volleyball. Unified Sports in RIIL member schools, creates an inclusive environment where everyone benefits. Unified Sports® combines people with intellectual disabilities (called athletes) and without intellectual disabilities (called partners) on sports teams for training and competition. The athletes experience new social opportunities and make new friends they may not have otherwise. The partners describe their

mentorship role as being equally rewarding. Many parents and siblings also find that Unified Sports offers a new way to spend time together and meet other families. Using sports to help break down barriers that have historically kept people apart, Unified Sports® promotes meaningful inclusion and acceptance of people

with intellectual disabilities in the community. In fact, 93% of partners say they gained a better understanding of their teammates through Unified Sports.



SHOWCASE CINEMAS TEAM OF THE WEEK, TOGETHER WE MAKE A DIFFERENCE!

SHOWCASE Cinemas continued as the presenting sponsor of Team of the Week, recognizing outstanding efforts and contributions RIIL student-athletes are making on and off the playing fields. Chosen winners selected from a pool of nominations weekly, recorded radio shout-outs played on air on Hot 106, 92.3PRO-FM and Lite Rock 105. Winning storylines ranged from teamwork, support, unity, fundraising and awareness efforts for charities and many more.





The Rhode Island Interscholastic League's eighth annual Peanut Butter Express, presented by BankRI, proved to be a great success with member schools collecting more than 2,100 jars totaling approximately 1.2 tons of peanut butter to benefit the Rhode Island Community Food Bank. For the third year in a row, Lincoln High organized the top collection effort with the school's student body donating nearly 1,430 pounds of peanut butter. BankRI actively pitched in, as well, by placing collection boxes at each of its 20 branch locations. BankRI employees and customers came through with an impressive 840 jars of peanut butter.

"We would like to congratulate Lincoln High School on another job well done, as well as the other schools that participated," said RIIL Executive Director Michael Lunney. "We understand that our member schools con-

The RIIL and iHeartMedia announced the launch of a new radio show, "The Rhode Island High School Sports Show," which debuted on January 27, 2022. The program focused on a wide array of high school sports, including the weekly score and standings, previews of upcoming matchups and interesting storylines involving local teams. COACHES EDUCATION


The RIIL has implemented a comprehensive certification process for all athletic coaches hired after January 1, 2012. This certification process which incorporates elements of the NFHS Coaches Ed program will help athletic coaches meet the significant challenges they face each day. This process, which must be renewed every five years, includes a combination of in-house and NFHS online courses approved by the RIIL. To assist, we

are organizing an annual conference for new and grandfathered coaches to fulfill their certification obligations. In addition, the conference will offer other coaches and athletic directors the opportunity to address numerous sport-related issues. During the 2021-22 school year, we held our preseason coaches' rules interpretation meetings virtually, reviewing current sport rules and providing presentations on concussions, heat acclimatization, orthopedic injuries and the benefits of playing multiple sports. By the start of the 2023 Spring Season, 100% of our school's coaches will be Level 1 nationally certified.



















STUDENT AMBASSADORS PROGRAM

Student-athletes were encouraged to represent their schools as RIIL Student Ambassadors. Ambassadors received information about various leadership opportunities and were asked to spread the word about RIIL initiatives with their school communities.



Educating our community on the dangers of Appearance and Performance Enhancing Substances (APES) and Nutrition & Dietary Supplement Safety: Funded through a grant from the R.I. Foundation, Operation Clean Competition continued its outreach to middle schools, high schools, colleges and universities across the state. During year 9, a total of 64 OCC programs were delivered through a combination of inperson and virtual presentations reaching nearly 4,000 student-athletes, youth, teens, college and university students and adult influencers. The free programs were delivered by OCC educational partner, the Taylor Hooton Foundation. Additional resources were also made available to member schools through the website: operationcleancomp.com.



The Rhode Island Interscholastic League honored 20 individuals, including 12 student-athletes, for their exemplary achievements over the past year at its 10th annual RIIL Awards Luncheon, May 11, 2022 at Valley Country Club in Warwick.





Bound for the University of Kentucky on a Division I baseball scholarship this fall, Brandyn Durand has been an Honor Roll Student at Bishop Hendricken every quarter of high school, maintaining a 3.49 GPA and earning membership to the National Honor Society, the Ambassador's Club and the President's List. A highlydecorated multi-sport athlete, heading into his final season of baseball, Durand had already earned eight All-State selections, three apiece in football and indoor track and one each in baseball and outdoor track. He was named 2021 Gatorade R.I. Baseball Player of the Year, 2021 MaxPreps R.I. Football Player of the Year and MVP of the 2021 State Championship Super Bowl among many other athletic honors. A captain on all four teams, Durand is a member of Hendricken's Leadership Academy and is a peer minister. He has volunteered at the school's youth sports camps and is an avid supporter of Special Olympics. This year, he also organized a fundraiser to support those impacted by the recent devastating tornado in Kentucky.

"Brandyn Durand will go down as potentially the best student athlete that has walked these storied halls," Bishop Hendricken athletic director Jamal Gomes said. "As great of a student athlete he is, it is not what stands out the most. His character is of such a high moral code, it is truly special. . . . Brandyn is the total package and an all-around great person."





A dual high school and R.I. College student, Eva White is the valedictorian of her class with a 4.939 GPA while taking almost entirely Honors and AP courses. She has collected multiple Academic Excellence Awards over the course of her high school career and will bring that wealth of knowledge with her to the U.S. Naval Academy, where she hopes to study nuclear engineering and compete in either swimming or tennis. White excelled in both sports at Mt. Hope, serving as captain for both and setting seven school records in swimming, while earning the title of 2022 Swimmer of the Year by the swim coaches' association. She played at No. 1 singles for the Huskies' tennis team, helping Mt. Hope to the 2019 Division II Championship and another appearance in the 2021 Division II Finals. An All-State musician and member of Mt. Hope's marching band, White is proficient in piano and flute and this year earned Southern New England Honors in Band. In addition, she is a member of the World Language and National Honor Societies and is a member of Mt. Hope's Math Team and Science Olympiad. She also sails and volunteers with Rhode Races RI and Swim Across America.





Prior to the passage of Title IX, Alice Sullivan had already been passionately advocating for the addition of girls athletics to the Rhode Island Interscholastic League. A long-time teacher and administrator in East Providence, R.I., she organized a group of fellow female physical education teachers in the 1960s that began holding intramural playdays for girls, along with workshops and officials clinics under the umbrella of the Rhode Island Division of Girls and Women's Sports.

In 1972, Rhode Island's Principals' Committee on Athletics appointed Sullivan as the RIIL's coordinator of girls' athletics. She later became the league's first assistant executive director and served the RIIL for 24 years before retiring in 1996. She remained a staunch supporter of girls athletics until her death in November 2003 at the age of 78, paving the way for today's female athletes who now have the opportunity to choose from 15 girls sports in the RIIL.

Cranston High School West sophomore Patricia Voccola was crowned the champion of Rhode Island's first official girls' interscholastic event when she won the Rhode Island Interscholastic League Girls State Individual Golf Tournament, June 21, 1971 at Exeter Country Club.

The tourney was organized after the Cranston (RI) School Committee petitioned the Principals' Committee on Athletics on Voccola's behalf, requesting a waiver of the RIIL rule limiting Interscholastic League competition to male competitors. The PCOA granted the request and the golf tournament was held. The 15-year-old Voccola beat out three other competitors for the golf title, which she successfully defended the following year.

The RIIL offered six additional sports for girls - cross country, basketball, field hockey, gymnastics, outdoor track and volleyball - for the 1971-72 school year. Fifty years later, the league now offers 15 girls sports, which also include soccer, tennis, competition cheerleading, ice hockey, indoor track and field, swimming, lacrosse and fast-pitch softball.

It is a voluntary, private, incorporated, non-profit organization of principals who pledge their high schools and participants to follow the Rules and Regulations of the League. More than 35,000 young men and women compete annually in thousands of competitions.
